Community Public Access Defibrillator Handbook

Guidance for Communities

Introduction

The Community Public Access Defibrillator 100 Project (cPAD 100) is a partnership between Yorkshire Ambulance Service (YAS) and 100 communities in Yorkshire. These communities have been identified as having a large number of cardiac arrests and patients who would benefit from early life-saving interventions.

Studies have proven that early basic life support and defibrillation give the best chances of survival for a patient whose heart has stopped. YAS has purchased a £2000 defibrillator and 24 hour access cabinet for location in each of the cPAD 100 communities.

What commitment is needed?

YAS will take responsibility for the defibrillator and the cabinet.

We will pay for the purchase of the defibrillator, consumables and cabinet

We will provide a training for the community if you wish.

We will ensure that should a patient require the equipment the caller is made aware of the location.

In return we would ask that you identify and fit the unit for us at the location in your community.

Provide a low wattage 240v power supply to keep the unit from freezing.

That someone in the community checks the unit on a periodic basis. We will show you how to do this.

Technical Stuff

The location for the cabinet needs to be easily accessible to the public and simple to describe by our 999 call taker to someone calling the Ambulance Service

The cabinet should be fitted approximately 2.0m from ground level.

It requires a 240v power supply and consumes approximately £4 of electricity a year.

The cabinet is approximately 44cm square and 22cm deep.

The cabinet and defibrillator together weigh around 12kg

We will provide a contact for you should you have any queries.

You will not be responsible for taking the equipment to the patient, our 999 call taker will organise that during the emergency call to the
